What is ClearPoint Image-Guidance for DBS Lead Placements?

It is an option for having DBS surgery in which your surgeon may have you placed 'asleep' under general anesthesia instead of being awake.

The surgeon uses a series of imaging scans for guidance to the intended target in the brain. If you are anxious about awake surgery, your doctor might choose image-guidance for you.

How often is ClearPoint Image-Guidance used for DBS Placements?

How is ClearPoint Image-Guidance Done?

- » The surgeon plans the trajectory using a series of MRI scans.
- » The patient is prepared for surgery and may be placed under general anesthesia.
- » A special set of hardware and software enable your surgeon to place the DBS lead.
- » After the procedure is done, if under general anesthesia, the patient is awakened and taken to recovery.





Are There Any Risks to Consider?

While ClearPoint Image-Guidance can offer benefits, all forms of surgeries performed in the brain can pose serious risks. These risks include infection, excessive bleeding, adverse reactions to anesthesia, severe brain injury, or death. It is important to discuss the risks of pursuing treatment with your physician to understand how they may impact your personal therapy decision.

ClearPoint Image-Guidance is not for everyone. You may need to meet certain medical guidelines, which will be assessed by your physician. You will likely have a screening process to see if ClearPoint Image-Guidance is right for you.

ClearPoint Image-Guidance is an advanced technology that is not available to all care centers and requires approval from your insurance to cover the expense. Check with your health insurance plan or your regional Medicare or Medicaid office to find out if your policy covers this procedure.

Bring a Friend or Family Member

Consider bringing a friend or family member to your doctor appointments to help you take notes and process the information provided by your doctor.



Ask your doctor about DBS support groups if you would like to hear from other people who have experienced DBS therapy.
